About the event

More than 500 people of all ages attended a 3 1/2 hour lively event in the Macy's Court of Westminster Mall as young adults age 13 to 22 creatively expressed their "dream of family" through music, art, spoken word, dance, and poetry. All in all, there were 8 performances on stage, numerous visual arts pieces, and more than 35 youth and young adults who contributed to "The Dream of Family" teen creative expression showcase. There were tears and cheers from the audience all throughout the event.



The program was hosted by Education for Successful Parenting (ESP) - a non-profit organization that is improving the well-being of children in our communities by teaching teens about parenting responsibilities before they form a family. The purpose of the Showcase was to increase awareness of ESP's curriculum that empowers teens with information and life-skills, so they can make healthy, responsible decisions. ESP also wanted to increase awareness of the strides they have made in

Orange County. Sharing the creative expressions of teens was anticipated to inspire public appreciation and support for the valuable work of this nonprofit organization.



A number of government officials and representatives also attended the event to honor the work of ESP and the teens. Congresswoman Loretta Sanchez made a special appearance to present a certificate and announce that the organization had been recognized in the Congressional Record. Her presence was especially appreciated in light of the prior week's tragedy in Tucson. Extra police and security were on hand at Westminster Mall to ensure her visit took place without incident.

Performance highlights

- Cathy Dang (age 22) opened and closed the Showcase with a vocal / guitar performance of her original song “Love You Can Breathe In,” accompanied by Jonathan Medina, written for Education for Successful Parenting
- An energetic hiphop dance was performed by the seven male members of Ohana, with a choreographic storytelling of a teen finding family through friends with a shared passion for dance
- There were two daunting and beautiful instrumental performances – one by Clemente Salgado (age 15) on violin, and one by Joe Di Fiore (age 17) on saxophone
- Amber Ellis (age 16) offered a courageous, soul-baring spoken word recounting of her journey from a challenging childhood to the strength of family and spirituality, followed by a remarkable gospel vocal performance
- Original poetry on the complexities of family was recited by Noemi Trevino (age 16)
- Two youth spoke to honor their parents: Brenda Sandoval (age 18) expressed heartfelt appreciation for her mother’s devotion, and Lurae Rubenstein (age 13) daughter of ESP’s founder/executive director read an essay about why her mother is her hero.





Guest speakers and government officials

- Michael Bargas, a football coach and health instructor from Estancia High School, who offered a testimonial about how his students and school have been welcoming the ESP programs into their classroom for the past 5 years
- Several teenagers - some leaders of ESP's Generation Next teen group -- shared the importance of the program in influencing them to make healthy, responsible choices before they form a family
- Congresswoman Loretta Sanchez spoke about how the support and encouragement of her immigrant parents made it possible for her and her siblings to go to college and pursue their dreams
- Westminster's Mayor Margie Rice – who is a mother, grandmother, and great grandmother - spoke of our community responsibility to protect vulnerable children and commended ESP's work to create safer family environments
- California State Assembly and Senate offices were also represented, and presented certificates of recognition and commendation
- Orange County Supervisor Janet Nguyen sent a proclamation declaring January 15, 2011 as "Education for Successful Parenting Day" in Westminster and Orange County.


All 33 young adult contributors to Showcase were presented with personalized certificates from each of the government officials and received a goody bag of gifts from event sponsors.

The mission of ESP is to improve the health and well-being of children in our communities by educating adolescents about parenting before they conceive the next generation of children.

Education for Successful Parenting (ESP) empowers teens with the information and life-skills to make healthy, responsible choices *before* they conceive the next generation of children.

By helping teens understand children's needs and the responsibilities of parenting, ESP provides teens with motives to stay in school and postpone parenting until adulthood, so they can fulfill their dreams of a happy and healthy family.

ESP's Goals: Reduce rates of teen pregnancy, Improve preconception health, Increase father involvement, and Prevent child abuse.

Since its inception, ESP has conducted 84 classes, instructed over 2,000 teenagers, developed programs for parents of teens, and launched a youth-led volunteer group called Generation Next.



After completing an ESP course, **over 90% of students report they are more willing to wait until adulthood before parenting, and they will be better able to provide, protect and nurture a future family.** These results are vitally important given the high numbers of fragile families. Child Abuse Reports were filed on behalf of 27,000 children in Orange County, and on behalf of 6 million children nationwide, during last year alone! Imagine if all teens were empowered with the information and life-skills that Education for Successful Parenting provides. Imagine if we could reduce the number of fragile families by even 50%!

ESP is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization that has been serving the community since 2005. Donations to ESP support classes, curriculum development, and organization sustainability.
